
- All open burning (e.g., burn barrels, brush piles, debris)
  - · Fireworks and exploding targets
- Fires outside of designated fire pits or approved devices
  - Fires using charcoal briquettes
    - Turkey fryers
    - Tiki torches

#### ALLOWED:

- Small, supervised wood campfires
- (must be contained within designated fire pits)
- Only in designated campgrounds, day-use areas, or on private land
  - Must follow Safe Wood Campfire rules
    - · Portable propane fire pits
- Gas or propane stoves and barbeques designed for cooking or heating

Burning, or otherwise failing to follow the conditions set out in this Fire Ban Order, will result in fines as well as All costs of managing, controlling, or extinguishing the fire incurred by the County shall be charged back to the landowner.

This order is issued under the Clear Hills County Council Bylaw No. 285-24.

# Public Works Programs & Services

#### **Driveway Snow Removal**

Clear Hills County provides Driveway Snow Removal to:

- Senior Citizens: Must provide one item for proof of age, i.e., birth certificate, driver's license or other document which includes date of birth.
- Special Needs: must be in possession and provide proof of a current Provincial Handicap Sticker.
- Full Time Bus Drivers: Must provide proof of full-time employment, annually letter from employer.

#### **Regional Water Line Tie-In**

Clear Hills County has a Regional waterline that transfers water from the Hamlet of Worsley Water Treatment Plant to the Hamlet of Cleardale Water Distribution Facility. Clear Hills County is committed to allowing residents to connect to the Regional potable Water Line for potable residential water supply.

- Clear Hills County will install the Waterline tie-in and the curb stop valve to the edge of the County Right of Way or the entry point to private land.
- The County will contribute a maximum of \$2000.00 (two thousand dollars) towards the installation of each approved Regional waterline tie-in and curb stop valve installation.
- Water Rates and Meters prices are set out as in current Bylaw: Water Works Distribution and Waste Water Collection System bylaw

#### **Annual Equipment Registry**

The intent of the equipment registry is to obtain an annual working list of available equipment and attachments to perform work on short-term projects.

Annually the County will advertise for contractors wishing to be included in the 'Annual Equipment Registry.' The packages are to be returned to the County office on the first Friday the office is open for business, after the New Year.

Any trucks wishing to be on the list for hauling gravel must submit their truck information with the 'Annual Equipment Registry' by the deadline.

#### SENIORS SUMMER DRIVEWAY GRADING

Clear Hills County offers to grade driveways for senior citizens and/or surviving spouse, as county operations permit, at no charge once per summer season.

Once signed up, you must contact the county to request the service. To qualify you must be 65 years of age or older. sign a waiver and provide proof of age. For more information or to request a form, call the clear hills county office at 780-685-3928 ext. 108

#### **Fire Permits**

Fire permits are required for all burning activities, except campfire, in the Forest Protection Area of Alberta during wildfire season, from March 1 to October 31.

To know which area you are planning to burn is, you can call the county office at 780-685-3925.

When burning in the Non-Permit area, please call the County office with the location, date, and contact information related to the burn so that a Burn Notice can be sent out informing correct people of the burn

#### THE ENVIRONMENTAL FARM PLAN (EFP)

**WHAT IS AN EFP?** The Environmental Farm Plan (EFP) is a free, voluntary, whole farm, self-assessment tool that helps producers identify their environmental risks and develop plans to mitigate identified risks.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS TO COMPLETING AN EFP? Maintaining a healthy environment is essential to the success of Alberta's agricultural producers. The Environmental Farm Plan (EFP) program helps you identify and address environmental risks\* in your operation. It will also increase your understanding of legal requirements related to environmental issues. \*The risks are environmental but many relate to personal health (e.g. wells).

**WHEN/WHY AM I REQUIRED TO DO AN EFP?** An EFP is a prerequisite for certain Sustainable Canadian Agricultural Partnership (SCAP) grants. It may also be a requirement if you wish to sell to some purchasers who have decided to use EFP as a sustainable sourcing tool.

**IS AEFP RUN BY THE GOVERNMENT?** No, EFP is run by the non-profit organization, Agricultural Research & Extension Council of Alberta (ARECA). The program is grantfunded by the provincial government.



Campfires are a great part of camping, but they must be handled responsibly. Whether you're in a campground or the backcountry, following basic fire safety can help prevent wildfires.

#### **Choosing a Safe Site**

Use designated fire pits, stoves, or rings in campgrounds. If you're outside of one:

- Choose a site clear of dry grass, bushes, leaves, branches, and peat moss
- Avoid areas with overhanging branches
- Use an existing site if available
- Pick level ground, sheltered from wind
- Have water nearby (or a large container if you're far from a water source)

#### **Preparing Your Campfire**

Have these essentials ready:

- A shovel or spade
- An axe or hatchet
- Enough water to fully put out the fire

#### If there's no fire ring:

- Clear a 1-metre area
- Dig down to mineral soil
- Remove all flammable material around the fire zone

#### **Putting Your Campfire Out**

Soak it. Stir it. Soak it again.

- Let the fire burn to embers
- Spread them out, then soak with water or dirt and stir
- Repeat until there's no smoke, steam, or heat
- The fire is out only when it's cool to the touch

Never bury a campfire—it can smoulder and reignite later.

### ARE YOU AWARE OF THE VSI (VETERINARIAN SERVICES INCORPORATED) PROGRAM?

- Aids in the development of livestock expansion with a long term goal of the producer and veterinarian services sustainability.
- The VSI program supplies a cost-share support to livestock producers, whereby Clear Hills County covers 50% of the cost eligible veterinary procedures.
- Membership is \$52.50 for a five year term.

#### DO YOU KNOW THE COUNTY HAS A BSE TESTING INCENTIVE PROGRAM? <

The BSE testing program is to encourage producers to participate in BST Testing and assist in realizing the target of 30,000 beef cattle annually being tested to keep Canada's status as a controlled BSE risk country.

Eligibility: must be a VSI member and resident/landowner in Clear Hills County with livestock. Restrictions: Only Veterinarian Clinics (and livestock owners) will have access to the BSE test results.

Process: VSI services provides the County with a list of members that had beef cattle tested in the quarterly report. The County then pays the member.

#### **Measles - General Information**

• Measles can be dangerous, especially for babies and young children. It can cause serious health complications like pneumonia, encephalitis and even death.

#### Measles symptoms typically include

- High fever (may spike to more than 104°F)
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Red, watery eyes
- Rash breaks out 3-5 days after symptoms begin





#### Measles is very contagious.

Measles spreads through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. You can get measles just by being in a room where a person with measles has been. This can happen even up to 2 hours after that person has left the room.

If one person has it, up to 9 out of 10 people nearby will become infected if they are not protected. An infected person can spread measles to others even before knowing they have the disease. You can spread measles to others from 4 days before through 4 days after the rash appears.

#### Protect yourself with the vaccine.

The best way to protect against measles is with the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine. MMR is safe and effective. Two doses of MMR vaccine are about 97% effective at preventing measles; one dose is about 93% effective.

#### Possible exposure:

If you think that you have measles or have been exposed to someone with measles, isolate yourself from others and call your healthcare provider, urgent care, or emergency room before arriving to be tested. Do not arrive at a health care facility without giving advance notice.






Hans & Lily Peters Regional Legacy Award

#### Stay Safe and Enjoy Summer: Tips for a Fun and Safe Season

Summer is a time for fun and relaxation, but it's important to keep safety in mind. Here are some essential tips to ensure you make the most of the season while staying safe.

#### 1. Stay Cool and Hydrated

High temperatures can lead to heat exhaustion and sunstroke. Stay hydrated with plenty of water and non-caffeinated, non-alcoholic beverages. Increase your vitamin C intake to help defend against heat-related issues. Wear light-colored clothing, seek shade, and never leave children or pets in parked vehicles.

#### Additional Tips for Beating the Heat:

Open windows and use fans to circulate air, but keep blinds closed.

Eat light, fresh foods and avoid using the oven or stove.

Turn off extra heat sources like computers and incandescent bulbs.

Take cold showers or baths, and use ice packs or wet towels on pulse points.

Cool your bedding in the freezer before sleeping.

Visit air-conditioned public places like libraries and malls.

2. Practice Sun Safety

Avoid sunburn by using broad-spectrum sunscreen with at least SPF 30. Apply it 20 minutes before going outside and reapply regularly. Wear a hat and UV-certified sunglasses. Protect children from sunlight, even during short outdoor periods.

#### 3. Prevent Forest Fires

Alberta faces a severe fire season. Most wildfires are human-caused and preventable. Use designated fire pits while camping, ensure fires are fully extinguished, and dispose of cigarette butts properly. Stay updated on fire bans and report wildfires to 310-FIRE (3473).

#### 4. Water Safety

Drowning is a serious risk. Equip yourself and your family with Transport Canada-approved life jackets. Supervise children closely around water, as they can drown in just one inch of water.

#### 5. Play Safe

Ensure backyard and playground equipment is secure. Supervise children, especially around trampolines, which should have safety net enclosures. Always watch children under 12 playing outdoors.

#### 6. Wear a Helmet

Protect yourself by wearing a helmet when biking, skateboarding, or using motorized off-road vehicles. Alberta law requires helmets for motorcyclists and ATV operators. Ensure helmets fit properly.

#### 7. Protect Your Pets

Provide pets with fresh water and shade. Walk them during cooler parts of the day, and avoid hot surfaces. Keep pets up to date on medications to prevent diseases from fleas, ticks, and mosquitoes.

#### 8. Respect Nature

Give wildlife plenty of space and never feed them. Dispose of waste properly to protect habitats. Follow park rules and respect trail closures. Drive carefully in wildlife areas.

#### 9. Monitor the Weather

Summer weather can change rapidly. Stay informed about the weather forecast and have a plan for shelter during severe weather conditions.

#### 10. Avoid Bug Bites

Wear light-colored clothing and insect repellent to protect against mosquitoes and ticks. Check for bites after being outside and treat them promptly to prevent infection.

#### 11. Keep Food Fresh

Practice safe food handling, especially when barbequing. Keep food at safe temperatures and discard any that has been at room temperature for more than two hours.

#### **Growing Strawberries in Alberta**

#### Where to Plant Strawberries

Choose a sunny spot with at least 6 hours of sunlight. Strawberry plants thrive in nutrient-rich, well-drained soil. Add compost before planting. For soil improvement tips, read "How to Improve Your Garden Soil."

#### **Strawberry Varieties for Alberta**

June Bearing: Produce one large crop in late spring or early summer. Best varieties for zone 3 include Kent, Honeoye, Bounty, Cavendish, Cabot, and Clooscap.

Ever Bearing: Produce two crops annually, one in early summer and another in early fall. Ideal for pots and fresh eating. Varieties include Fort Laramie and Ogallala.

Day Neutral: Produce fruit continuously throughout the season. Good for fresh eating. Varieties include Tristar, San Andreas, Seascape, Albion, and Fern.

#### **Planting Strawberries**

Plant from late April to late May in zone 2/3 Alberta. Plant crowns just above the soil surface and space 10-12 inches apart. Mulch with straw or use black plastic mulch to retain moisture and prevent rot.

#### **Increasing Strawberry Yield**

Pinch off blossoms in the first month to strengthen roots. Remove runners to increase yield. Replace plants every 4-5 years with new ones from runners.

#### **Fertilizing Strawberries**

Use fertilizer tea or fresh compost each spring.

#### **Watering Strawberries**

Water well, especially during fruit setting. Avoid wetting leaves to prevent mold.

#### **Harvesting Strawberries**

Harvest when fully red. Store in the fridge for longer shelf life.

#### **Deterring Pests**

Use straw mulch, beer traps, or Slug-B-Gone for slugs. Use decoy rocks or netting to deter birds. Place decoys early to train birds to avoid the area.

Canada Day celebrates the anniversary of the Constitution Act which was signed on July 1, 1867. This was the day that the three British colonies of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and the Province of Canada united to form a single country.

#### **History of Canada Day**


On July 1, 1867 the British North American Act united the British colonies of North America into one federation called Canada. Later the act would be renamed to the Constitution Act. This is the day that many Canadians mark as the birth of their country.

At first the day wasn't widely celebrated as most Canadians still considered themselves to be British. In 1879 the day became a national holiday called Dominion Day. This was because the country was called its own "dominion" in the Constitution Act. However, it still wasn't a widely celebrated holiday. Over time the day became more popular in Canada, especially during the 100 year celebration in 1967.

The day was officially renamed to Canada Day in 1982. There was actually a lot of debate. Some people wanted to stay with the old name, but eventually the name was changed. It was on this day in 1980 when the song "O Canada" was officially made the national anthem of the country.

The first color television broadcast in Canada was made on this day in 1966. Sir John A. MacDonald was the first Prime Minister of Canada. He also wrote a significant portion of the Constitution Act.

Official celebrations are held on Parliament Hill in the capital city of Ottawa, Ontario.







#### Thunder & Lightning: What's the Difference?

**Lightning** is a powerful electrical discharge caused by the buildup of opposite charges in storm clouds. When these charges connect, energy is released as a bright flash — lightning.

**Thunder** is the sound lightning makes. The air around the bolt heats instantly, then explodes outward, creating a shockwave.

You see lightning before hearing thunder because light travels faster than sound. To estimate distance, count the seconds between flash and boom — divide by 5 to get miles.

#### Types of Lightning:

- Cloud to ground (most common)
- Cloud to cloud
- Intra-cloud
- Rare positive lightning travels from ground to cloud

**Safety Tip:** When thunder roars, go indoors — and stay there for 30 minutes after the last sound.


